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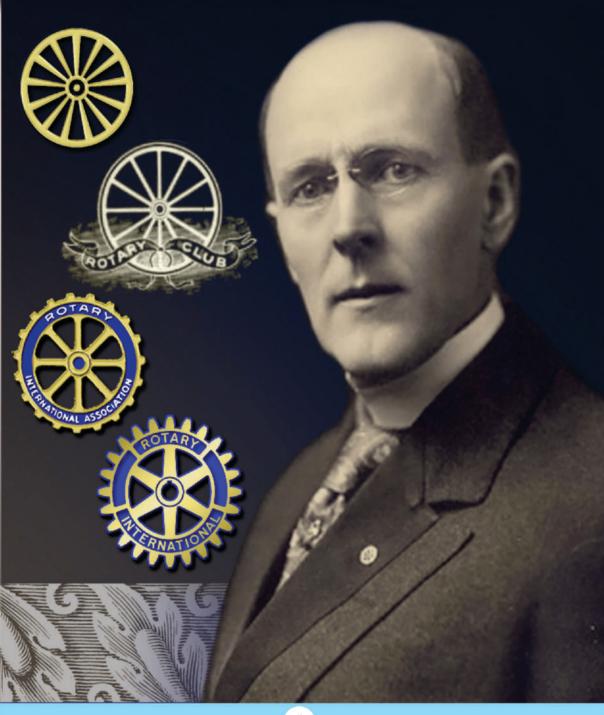

HISTORY OF ROTARY IN INDIA

The Rotary Club of Calcutta became the first Rotary club chartered in India on 1 January 1920. Today, more than 3,000 clubs operate throughout the country, R.J. Coombes is credited with starting India's first club. But Canadian James Wheeler Davidson is largely responsible for Rotary's growth in the country.

As a member of the Rotary International committee that explored extending the organization into other countries, Davidson departed in August 1928 to help establish clubs in Asia and the Middle East. His trip turned into a two-and-a-half-year odyssey that resulted in the chartering of 23 clubs in 12 countries.

Only two clubs held charters in India at the outset of Davidson's journey: Calcutta and Lahore (in present-day Pakistan). The clubs were more than 1,000 miles and a 40-hour train ride apart, Davidson noted in reports back to RI.

Arriving in Bombay in February 1929 with his wife and daughter, he was intent to start a club there.

"It was not an easy task to organize a club in this big city of 1,200,000," he mused. Three attempts had failed prior to his arrival. But in March of that year, Davidson successfully formed a club in Bombay that would receive its charter on 8 May.

He organized a club in Delhi next, before visiting Rotarians in Calcutta, where Nitish C. Laharry was serving as club secretary. Laharry would become the first RI president from India in 1962-63.

On to Madras

On 23 April, Davidson boarded a train in Calcutta for a 1,032-mile trip to Madras. He had been advised to travel by sea to avoid the excessive heat common at that time of year, but opted to go by rail to see the countryside.





"It was a real delight to watch the change as we passed from north to south, from the temperate zone into the tropics," he later wrote. "Not only did the vegetation change, but the buildings altered some and the people appeared to take on a different appearance, the tendency to dress in white at Calcutta changed to red as we worked south."

Two days later, Davidson convened a committee in Madras, which organized a club on 10 May. (It received its charter on 19 July). "With the organizing of the Madras club, my plans as originally formulated, have been carried out," Davidson noted. "We now have a club in each one of the main geographical divisions in India and further extension work should now be carried out by local Rotarians. I consider that the five clubs that now exist firmly establishes Rotary in India."

Today, Rotary has grown to include more than 1,20,000 Indian Rotarians. In addition to RI President Rtn.Nitish Laharry,(1962-63) Rtn. Rajendra K. Saboo (1991-92) Rtn.Kalyan Banerjee (2011-12) and many Rotary leaders have called the country home, including more than 10 RI Directors.

With the opening of Rotary to Women in 1989, clubs in India started began to invite the fair sex also to join Rotary clubs. In 1991-92 three clubs in India had Women Presidents R.C.Thuckalay (Dist.3210), R.C. Palladam(Dist.3200), and Mudagod(Dist.3170), apart from a charter President in Thiruvanathpuram(Dist.3210) District 3200 also had a woman charter President in 1992, Rtn. Elsamma Thomas of Nilgris West, wife of RI Director Rtn.P.C.Thomas. A few clubs were formed in India with exclusive membership of women Rotarians.

In 1998-99 Rotary year India had her first woman District Governor; she was none other than the well informed Rtn. Madhura Chatrapathy of District 3190. Next was the turn of the neighbouring District 3230 to present a Woman District Governor, Rtn. Rekha Shetty. As of April 2017 the women population in Rotary in India is more than 10000 and many more women leaders.





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ROTARY INTERNATIONAL DISTRICT 3170







A Brief History of District 3170(Zone 5)

The present RI District 3170 was first carved out as District 317 from the erstwhile District 315 in the year 1959-60, which was covering entire Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and part of Tamil Nadu. Later in 1970-71, some more areas were converted into new districts 318, 319, and 313. The territory of District 317 then included entire North Karnataka, Southern parts of Andhra Pradesh and Maharashtra. Then again in 1983-84, another new district 316 was formed taking out Gulbarga, Raichur, Bidar, Bellary, Chitradurga and Anantpur and Nellore district of Andhra Pradesh. Now district 3170 covers Kolhapur, Sangli, Ratnagiri, Sindhudurg districts of Maharashtra State, Dharwad, Gadag, Haveri, Bijapur, Bagalkot, Belgaum and North Kanara districts of Karnataka State and entire Goa State.

It was in 1959-60 that our district was created by redistricting od District 315 and 320 with 36 clubs as its constituents. The boundries were defined as "Goa India", Maharashtra State, that portion south of latitude 18 degrees. Mysore State, that prtion south of latitude 18 degrees, Andhra Pradesh, south of latitude 16 degrees.

On 23rd April 1959, as a result of ballot, Rtn B. S. Sidwa of Bangalore was elected as the first governor nominee of District 317. Being bitten by the Rotary Extension bug, Governor Sidwa went all out to sponsor new clubs. Firmly believing in establishing new clubs of Rotary to exert its widest influence, Sidwa spared no pains in going ahead with his plans with unimaginable speed. His sponsoring 22 new clubs in his year 1959-60 may probably a world record then! He had the experience of sponsoring of 8 clubs as Governor's Special Representative even before 1959. At the end of 1959-60 there were seven clubs in Maharashtra, 37 in Mysore and 13 in Andhra Pradesh.

With 22 additional clubs in the very first year, District 317 started with the Rotary Message reaching even Taluka towns. Through subsequent Governors, believing in strengthening the existing clubs could not be as enthusiastic rather over enthusiastic as Sidwa, there was slow but continuos growth in number of Clubs. By 1969-70, this district 317 has grown into an unwieldy district with 88 clubs. As the other five districts in India has also similar growth in the number of clubs, Rotary International decided to double the number of districts. So it was in the year 1970-71, that 12 districts were carved out of the previous six districts. The Bangalore conference in 1970 under the leadership of Governor Rangaswamy was the last District Conference of the undivided District 317.

The newly formed District 317, was given the following jurisdiction "India, Maharashtra, that portion south of latitude 18 degrees, Goa, Mysore that portion north of latitude 14 degrees, Andhra Pradesh, that portion of south of latitude 16 degrees and north of latitude 14 degrees, and the number of clubs came down to 40.





Rtn Nahni T. Kapadia was earlier nominated as Governor Nominee for 1971-72. Due to the sudden decision of bifurcation and lack of time, Nahni was asked whether he was prepared for preponement of the district leadership. On account of his inability to accept the permitted proposal, a postal ballot for election of Governor-nominee was held in April 1970, which gave the late Rtn Sakharam Ghatge of Kolhapur as the first Governor of the newly constituted District 317.

From 1970-1973 three clubs in Andhra Pradesh namely, Bupatla, Chirala and Ongole were facing the problem of proper communication with the Governors of District 317, thus retarding their progress. This clubs being nearer to the clubs in district 315, Rtn Pandurang Mangalwedhe DG 317 and his counterpart Governor Rtn Umamaheshwar Rao of 315 jointly proposed to the Rotary International Redistricting Committee to transfer these clubs to the district 315. The district conferences of both the districts passed the resolutions accordingly. The R. I. Board agreed and after transfer the original description of the boundaries remained the same, with the addition of a clause "excluding the district of Prakasam" in May 1973.

For a Governor to start his year by losing three clubs was not an enviable position. But the district's loss was as much of a gain to these clubs as to district 315. Chartering three new clubs under the leadership of District Governor Rtn Pandurang Mangalwedhe of Chikodi, Chiplun and Solapur North in 1973-74 made up this loss. Thanks to the spade work done by his predecessors.

Like on the previous occasion the number of clubs in not only district 317 but also in other districts increased to such an extent that R. I. had to consider redistricting with in little over a decade. The new districts formed by reallocation of clubs were more than doubled. The last conference before the bifurcation was held at Hubli under the governor-ship of Rtn Dr R. B. Patil in 1984. After redistricting District 317 had to part with 33 clubs in Maharashtra, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh and gained two clubs from Uttar Kannada and the new Rotary Year 1984-85 began with 46 Clubs. In this redistricting, as already mentioned earlier, revenue districts were the constituents of the Rotary District. From then on till up to date the jurisdiction of District 317, now called as District 3170 is as follows:

Karnataka – Revenue Districts of Bijapur, Belgaum, Dharwad, Gadag, Haveri and Karwar.

Maharshtra – Revenue Districts of Kolhapur, Sangli, Sindhudurg and Ratnagiri.

State of Goa.

Looking to the slow and steady growth in the membership of the clubs in all the then 30 districts the day may not be far of for consideration of further redistricting.





As Governor for 1971-72 the second year of the newly formed district, Rtn Nahni Kapadia laid a strong foundation for systematic district organization with well knit and coordinated committees and this has been a boon to his successors.

While many other districts were struggling in selecting the Governor-Nominee by the method of election, leading sometimes to unhealthy and un-Rotary like practices, our district boasted of a strong nominating committee procedure for nominating Governor-Nominee even before 1970. The procedure of selection by the nomination committee has been continuously streamlined to make it almost foolproof. Except three freak exceptions, the district has approved all the candidates selected by the nominating committee, though there were many occasions in the later stages when elections became necessary, yet the nominating committee's candidate came out successfully.

Brief history of Rotary club of curchorem

The year 1977 saw the beginning of new era in Curchorem, Sanvordem with the formation of the Rotary Club of Curchorem-Sanvordem. This idea was originally conceived by Rotarian Durganand Sanvordekar, a senior Rotarian of R. C. of Margao, who resides in Curchorem. Subsequently in the month of July 1977 this Rotary Club of Curchorem- Sanvordem was founded and installed.

It is very important to note that ROTARY CHARITABLE TRUST was formed in the year 1998-99 and still continues to give financial and other assistance to the needy people of the locality.

In 1983-84 the club decided to adopt Chirkonali Village the village along with the primary school children are given proper services by this Rotary Club. Also the village was provided with Electricity and mini bus service through the respective departments. The club also adopted new village "Shirvoi" on 2nd October 1997 and a Rotary library was inaugurated at the hands of the District Governer.

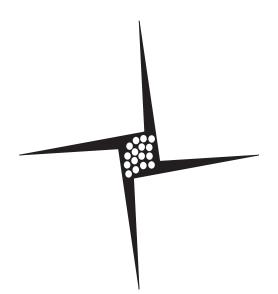

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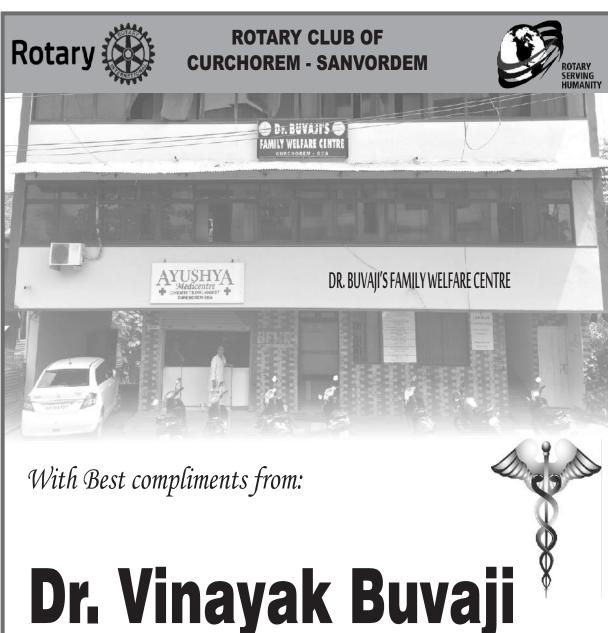

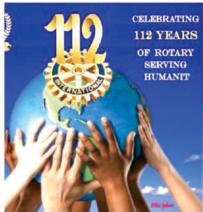

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10 things to know before GST rollout



GST will be rolled out from July 1, 2017 and just before its implementation the Govt. had issued various notifications on GST.

Key takeaways from such notifications are given hereunder:

- 1. There is a requirement to mention HSN code of items in tax invoice under GST. Now the Govt. has given some relief to small assessees with annual turnover uptoRs 1.5 crores. They are not required to mention HSN code in their tax invoice. Taxpayers having turnover in the range of Rs 1.5-5 crore will be required to mention only two digits of HSN code and taxpayers with turnover more than Rs 5 crore will be required to mention four digits of HSN code.
- 2. Now the Govt. has given exemption from reverse charge in those cases wherein the value of goods or services does not exceed Rs 5000 and such goods or services are received by registered person from the unregistered person.
- 3. Earlier Military canteens ('Canteen Stores Department')were not required to pay any indirect tax on purchase of goods. Now Military canteens will be required to pay GST at the time of purchase of goods and they would be entitled to refund of 50 percent of inputtax under GST.
- 4. Now e-commerce operators (like Ola, Uber) are required to pay GST on radio taxi services.
- 5. Now e-commerce operators (like MMT, Oyo rooms) are required to pay GST on services of hotel accommodation only when such hotels are not registered under GST.
- 6. Exemption from reverse charge has been given to registered person on purchase of second hand goods from unregistered person subject to the condition that buyer will pay GST on its subsequent sales.
- 7. Now builders would not be able to claim credit of unutilized input tax on supply of construction services.
- 8. Earlier UN and Foreign diplomatic missions were not required to pay any indirect taxes. Now they are required to pay GST and they will be entitled to claim a refund of GST subsequently.
- 9. GST will be be levied at rate of 5% on various goods used for petroleum operations subject to some conditions.

10. Any services provided by Panchayat will not be liable to GST.

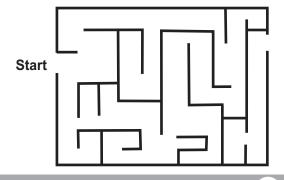

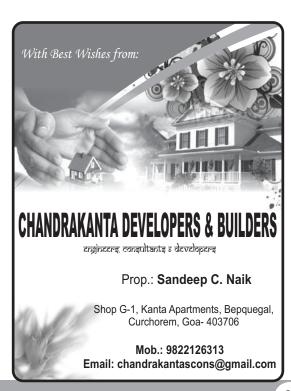
A TALE OF A TONGUE

SUVARNA PRASHANA FOR CHILDREN FROM BIRTH UPTO 5 YEARS OF AGE

Introduction:

In today's fast life style, little time is devoted towards the health of children. Not following proper community rules, decreased individual hygiene, unbalanced time restrained food habits are all the causes for different diseases, reduced growth & ill health of children.

Today's vaccines can only prevent selected & specific diseases in children, but do not take care of overall health & intellect, etc. factors. So the need of the hour is to provide a boost for physical & mental health, which is given in the correspondence to auspicious occasion to even eliminate ill effects.

Objectives f the Study:

To study the effect of Suvarna Prashan in normal children

Source of data:

The children of the age group 0-5 yrs attending Suvarna Prashana camp at CHIKITSALAYA Ayurveda Clinic & Panchkarma center, OF-9, 1st Floor, Bldg 'A', Venkatesh Chambers, Curchorem – Goa. During the period of Jan 17 to July 17 were screened. Among a total 87 children, those who were regular & attended all 7 camps were chosen, i. e. 63 children, rest 24 were dropped out.

Inclusion Criteria:

Age group 0-5 yrs.

Healthy children at time of beginning of study.

Selection irrespective of sex, caste, etc.

Attending all 7 Suvarna Prashan Camps from Jan-July 17

Exclusioin Criteria:

Age group above 5 years.

Having any illness at time of beginning study.

Discontinued or missed any of the 7 camps.

Design:

It is a single blind comparative clinical study. In this study comparison of the assessment criteria like growth was made with the normal growth values available in the text.

Intervention:

Suvarna Prashan drops were administered, 2 drops orally, to each child, in a single dose, from morning 8 am - 12 noon, on an auspicious occasion (Pushya Nakshatra) every month.

A total of 7 doses were given from Jan 17 to July 17.

Assessment of growth & other factors were made for the subsequent doses.





Medicine for Suvarna Prashana:

Ashtamangal ghrita

Ingredients: Vacha, Kushta, Brahmi, Shweta Sarshapa, Anantmul, Saindhav Lavana, Pippali, Water, Ghee, Honey, Suvarna bhasma.

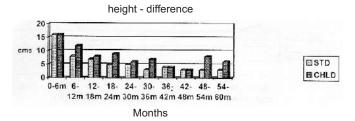
Dose: 2 drops, orally early morning or on an auspicious occasion.

Assessment Criteria:

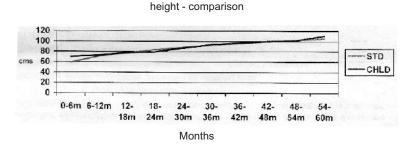
Growth – height & weight; Activity of mind; physical activity; appetite; digestion; general health; relief from specific recurrent illness – cold, fever.

Results:

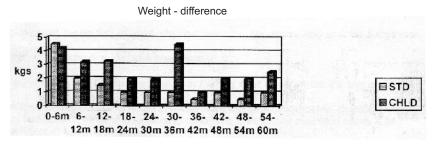
STD shows standard rise in height for a period of 6 months. CHLD shows rise in height of children taken for the study in 6 months.

STD shows standard rise in weight for a period of 6 months CHLD shows rise in weight of children taken for study in 6 months.

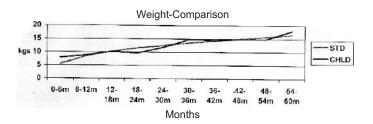

Activity of mind: Positive results were seen in 26 children with respect to alertness, memory, curiosity, interest, speech & knowledge.

Physical Activity : Positive results were seen in 25 children with respect to walking & playing.

General Health: A maximum of 51 children showed improved general health.

Appetite: 16 children had an increased appetite.

Digestion: Capacity to digest the food was increased in 22 children.

Recurrent Cold: Remission of recurrent occurrence of cold was reduced in 16 children.

Recurrent fever: 4 children had a cure for recurrent fever.

No Change: 4 children had no specific changes seen.

Negative benefits: 1 child each developed reduced appetite, reduced digestion & reduced weight respectively, whereas 1 child had constipation frequently. So total of 4 children had negative experience.

Conclusion:

From the above results it is understood that growth in terms of height & weight was better than normal values as the graph climbs up the normal. At times the down slope was due to very low ht & wt at the beginning of the camp, which is justified by the difference graph which is always the normal value.

There is improvement in activities of mind, physical activities, general health, appetite & digestion.

Cure to the frequent occurrence of cold & fever is seen.

A minimum of 4 children had no change at all, may be they were healthy from the beginning.

Negative changes were seen in 4 children in which there was reduced appetite, digestion, weight & one had constipation. This results may be due to climatic conditions & uncontrolled over food & has nothing to do with the effect of Suvarna Prashana.

This regimen is economical, effective & equally safe.
